A primed, new Canadian pharmacy landscape

In Education:

- 1. Replacement of the BSc with the PharmD as entry-to-practice degree.
- 2. Emergence of clinical "bridging" programs for BSc-trained pharmacists.
- 3. Growth of Pharmacy Practice Residency Programs in number and scope.
- 4. Sundown of the Graduate PharmD Programs (UBC and UT).

In Practice:

- 1. New models of care, new services, new healthcare platforms
- 2. Expanding scope of pharmacy practice and new pharmacist roles
- 3. Pharmacists as central to the healthcare system: new opportunities and challenges

A new gap, a new need, a new opportunity

- The need for clinically competent pharmacists has been well-addressed
- Some pharmacists pursue non-pharmacy-specific master-level programs (e.g., MBA, MHA, MPH) or certificate programs
- There is no longer a *pharmacy-specific* educational path designed for pharmacists to become professional leaders ...until now.
- First and only pharmacy-specific leadership program in Canada, focused on developing tomorrow's leaders in the profession

Staying ahead of changing trends in the profession

- The GDPL was designed to:
 - Give pharmacists leadership skills that historically took years of experience to obtain
 - Open doors to pharmacists who want to advance their skills as leaders
 - Give pharmacists in rural/remote communities access to leadership development
 - Respond to a robust engagement with a range of stakeholders and employers
 - Graduate capable, marketable pharmacy leaders who can lead across a settings
